

Key achievements to date until July 2022:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
 Sports Premium grant was used to improve the school playground for our pupils who's needs are becoming more complex. The total grant was added to the money spent improving playground facilities making it safer for the pupils to use and reduce any risks of injuries. Astro turf with cushioning was fitted throughout the whole playground taking away any concrete that could injure any of our pupils. Gross motor equipment was fitted in the playground and the old wooden equipment removed. The new playground equipment gives more scope for gross motor play and physical exertion. It allows for pupils to interact both physically and socially as well as safely. The equipment encourages balancing, climbing, strength and fitness to be developed. The equipment is also used for physical activities out of school terms when school provided holiday schemes. Money will also be used from the school budget to support the Sports Premium Spending.
